6. Priority will be given to those applicants who are using the scholarship for continuing education
 - BA, BS, MA, or MS) in security or other related subjects such as safety or management.
 - Security related seminars (CFE, EHS, etc. seminars) may be given consideration on a case by case basis.

GUIDELINES

1. Intentions for use:
 - Academic Advancement in the Security or Safety fields applied to either a degree or advanced degree such as a Masters or Doctorate.
 - Any course of study offered by ASIS
2. Covered items within the ASIS Programs:
 - Books and materials
 - Class Fees
 - Testing Fees
 - Travel expenses
3. Limitations on time to utilize.
 - The recipient of the Pusey-Barton Scholarship must fully utilize the award within two years of the date of receipt of the award.
 - If the award is not used by that time, it is expected that the recipient return the amount of the award, in full, to the Chapter for reallocation.

Kansas Business and Industry Forum Stresses the Value of Private Sector-Government Partnerships in Disaster Response and Recovery

The *Third Annual Business and Industry Forum for Disaster Response and Recovery* was held at the Great Plains Joint Training Center in Salina, Kansas on May 26-27, 2010. This joint initiative of the Kansas Department of Emergency Management (KDEM) and the Adjutant General of the State of Kansas, engaged private sector stakeholders in disaster response and emergency management planning efforts. Featuring individual and panel presentations, static displays, an introduction to Crisis City, and a hazardous materials response exercise, the program provided current information for private sector interests on the disaster response process.

Emphasizing that “all disasters are local,” Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Region 7 Response Coordinator Dan Best advised that while the federal government can provide significant resources, it is local government that has ultimate responsibility for response and recovery. Beth Freeman, the FEMA Region 7 Administrator, told forum participants that government must partner successfully with business and industry because it is the private sector that can have the greatest impact on long term community recovery efforts.

One excellent panel consisted of business representatives from across Kansas who had been severely impacted by natural disasters, including the 2007 Greensburg tornado. A key perspective shared by all was that employees and community members are often the first responders to disasters. The panelists’ experiences highlighted the need to:

- Get “employees temporarily on their feet” after a disaster.
- Form a redevelopment group to assist businesses that may want to leave an area after a disaster.
- Have an emergency management/disaster recovery plan for identified risks.

Consciously work the plan with frequent and meaningful exercises and disaster recovery tests.

Another highlight was the keynote presentation by Jeremy Jackson, of the Office of Kansas Attorney General, profiling the Kansas State Fusion Center. Using a multi-discipline philosophy, and an understanding that private industry is the heart of the economy, the Fusion Center is a focused government effort to tap into the expertise of private sector subject matter experts to operate fluidly in an asymmetric threat environment. Structured as a sensitive compartmented information facility, private sector interests are involved in intelligence strategic analysis. Featured as a “Kansas solution to a Kansas problem,” the initiative fuses military and homeland security intelligence without compromising classified information.

On all accounts, this well-planned and well-attended forum enabled businesses across the region to interact with key government decision makers at the local, state, and federal levels. The focus on forming alliances demonstrated recognition at multiple levels of government that the private sector must be a key player in disaster response and recovery planning.

KC-ASIS Luncheon Meeting Minutes June 2010

The meeting began at 11:34 AM with a greeting from Chairman Steve Brown, CPP and the playing of the National Anthem followed by a moment of silence. Mr. Brown reminded members there would be no meeting in July and that the August meeting would be held at Deer Creek Club. Attendees will have the option of remaining after that meeting for a round of golf.

New members were recognized and all attendees introduced themselves.

Chapter Vice-Chair Brandon Kehl provided an update for online registration of the upcoming KCASIS annual charity golf tournament. Participants may register on the website now even though the 2009 tournament information is still posted. Mr. Kehl expects to have the 2010 information posted on the website imminently. Jon Gann also provided registration forms for interested participants to complete.

RJ Hope, CPP was introduced by Officer Mike Betten and recognized for successful completion of the CPP Exam. Mr. Hope described the value of attending Officer Betten's CPP Review Course for anyone who plans to eventually pursue the CPP certification. Officer Betten reminded everyone that the study sessions are held annually at the beginning of each year.

Craig Carver from Crime Stoppers announced that his organization is seeking cooperation from all companies to provide a pool of volunteers to help with the SAFE program, TIPS Hotline, and other programs. He emphasized that this is a great way for professionals to serve the local community.

ITEM: GAO Urges to Emphasize Intermodal Facilities

In a new report, the Government Accountability Office suggests the Transportation Security Administration should "focus on securing ... intermodal transportation terminals—locations where multiple modes or types of passengers or cargo transportation connect [and] merge ... TSA has not conducted comprehensive risk assessments for the aviation and surface transportation sectors," and DHS has opportunities "to strengthen activities related to" personnel, "operational and management processes," and "security and related technologies."

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration is warning consumers about a potentially harmful product represented as "Generic Tamiflu" sold over the Internet. The fraudulent product does not contain Tamiflu's active ingredient, oseltamivir; instead, it contains cloxacillin, which is in the same class of antibiotics as penicillin, which some patients may be allergic to.
