Police in Rotterdam have begun installing new, high-tech security systems in stores across the Dutch city, in an effort to help local businesses combat theft in particularly crime-plagued neighborhoods. Unlike most security systems, though, Rotterdam's new device doesn't feature any high-pitched alarms or flashing lights. All it does is [spray synthetic DNA](#).

As the New York Times explains, the synthetic spray that the system emits is visible only under ultraviolet light, but contains [special DNA markers that are unique to each location](#). When a criminal robs an equipped store, for example, the system will automatically mists everyone in the area with the synthetic spritz. Once police apprehend a suspect, then, they can check him for traces of the spray, and automatically pin him to a precise location. The city is also promoting a new DNA crayon, which people can use to mark valuable products like computers or cameras, and identify them as stolen.

While Rotterdam police admit that they haven't yet used the system to make an arrest, they insist that its primary purpose is to dissuade criminals -- not catch them. Many stores with the system have already posted signs displaying ominous warnings, like "You Steal, You're Marked." Officials say that a large part of the intimidation factor is simply the fact that DNA, to most people, remains a threateningly mysterious phenomenon. "No one really knows what it is," says Donald van der Laan, owner of the Rhine Group, which distributes the spray. "No one really knows how it works."

Because the system is employee-operated, however, some stores have already experienced a few awkward false alarms. As it turns out, the alarm is activated whenever store employees pull a \$10 bill from a special bill clip behind the counter. Innocent bystanders, meanwhile, have also been inadvertently sprayed, but thus far, no one has been wrongly accused of a crime.

It may take some time to get used to, but Rotterdam's new cow-branding approach to crime deterrence is certainly intriguing. Its potential for triggering false alarms could waste the city's time and resources, but if it reduces Rotterdam's crime rate, police may not mind responding to cries of 'wolf' every now and then.

This course trains key response personnel within a local jurisdiction who are required to prevent, mitigate, manage, and/or resolve a weapon of mass destruction (CBRNE)/terrorism incident. Participant learning occurs in multidiscipline teams. Upon completion, these teams will be able to conduct a capabilities-based comprehensive CBRNE/terrorism risk (threat & vulnerability), capabilities, and needs (planning organization, equipment, training and exercises) assessment.

Target Audience: Awareness-level emergency personnel who will respond to a CBRNE/terrorism incident. Law Enforcement, Fire Service, Emergency Medical Services, Hazardous Materials, Public Health, Health Care, Public Works, Emergency Management, Personnel required to conduct vulnerability assessments of jurisdiction-selected sites, and private sector and military (if invited by host jurisdiction).

Prerequisites: Participants should work in one of the preceding disciplines/services, possess a working knowledge of the jurisdiction's Emergency Operations Plan and complete a CBRNE/terrorism incident awareness course. TEEX, in cooperation with the Office of Grants and Training (G&T), distributes a WMD/Terrorism Awareness for Emergency Responders course via the internet at www.teexwmdcamus.com.

Certificates for this course will be awarded by the Texas Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) via Texas A&M University. For more information about TEEX and other courses offered by them online and classroom based, visit their website: www.teex.com.

This course teaches participants how to apply all phases of the DHS and FEMA risk management process to jurisdictional critical infrastructure and key resources. Through lectures, discussions and classroom activities, students learn methods to identify and prioritize risks from all hazards, assess vulnerabilities, estimate consequences, and use equipment, training, and exercises to mitigate risk. The first day will be classroom instruction and the second day has a field activity.

Target Audience: Suggested participants include awareness, supervisory, and managerial staff who respond to or have oversight responsibilities regarding incidents caused by terrorism, natural disaster, major accidents and all other hazards. Course participants general include the following disciplines: Law Enforcement; Fire Service; Emergency Medical Services; Hazardous Materials; Public Health; Public Works; Emergency Management; Emergency Communications; and Governmental Administrative.

Prerequisites: There are no required prerequisites for this course.

Meeting Minutes

KC-ASIS AUGUST LUNCHEON October 7, 2010 Meeting Minutes

The meeting began at 11:30 AM with a greeting from Chairman Steve Brown, CPP and the playing of the National Anthem followed by a moment of silence for members of the Armed Forces serving in harm's way.

Mr. Brown thanked Herb Farnsworth for hosting the luncheon.

Mr. Brown welcomed the new members present. All attendees introduced themselves.

It was noted that the Chapter had reached its 50 year anniversary that month. Pat Quinn, CPP (the longest tenured member) was photographed alongside the newest member in attendance for the newsletter. Jon Gann read a commemorative letter from ASIS President Joseph Grainger acknowledging the milestone. The Chapter's many accomplishments were detailed.

Mr. Brown next opened debate for creating KCASIS 50 Year Anniversary lapel pins for the current dues-paying members. The pins will be given out as gifts during the 2010 Holiday Meeting. Thomas Duenez advised that he had previously worked with a vendor to design and create similar pins and that he estimated that creating 50 Year Anniversary pins would run at approximately \$6.99 each for 100 pins.

A motion was introduced to fund the design and purchase of commemorative lapel pins for the dues-paying members, not to exceed \$1,000 in cost. The motion was carried, seconded, and approved by a voice vote.

Bill Getz, CPP reminded the attendees that the ASIS Webinar will be hosted at State Street Corporation in downtown Kansas City, MO on Wednesday, October 13th. He emphasized that lunch would be provided, free of charge, and that it was important for anyone interested in attending to RSVP by the 11th.

Mr. Brown announced that Dr. Ken Christopher had won the 2010 Security Professional of the Year Award. Dr. Christopher's tremendous achievements and contributions to the security field were noted. The Board will present the award to Dr. Christopher at his workplace when he returns from his most recent business trip.

No nominations had been received yet for Security Officer of the Year and Mr. Brown stressed that nominations were due by October 20th for consideration.

Attendees were reminded that the Kansas City Crime Commission luncheon would be at the downtown Marriott Hotel on October 14th. The Chapter had sponsored a table and there was still room available for three more members to attend. Otherwise, the seats would be offered to any law enforcement officers who would like to have them.

Mr. Brown announced that the November Chapter luncheon would be held at Deer Creek Golf Club. Cpt. Mitchell with the KCMOPD Special Operations Division will give a presentation about his unit's efforts at providing security during the NAACP Convention over the past summer.

The attendees took a break for lunch.

The speaker, Scott Hamby of US Bank, was introduced by Mr. Brown. Mr. Hamby discussed the challenges that are faced by security and investigations professionals within a banking institution including physical security countermeasures, administrative responsibilities, and executive protection considerations. At the conclusion of the presentation, Mr. Brown gave Mr. Hamby an AMC Theaters gift card as a token of gratitude.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:00 PM. Attendees were welcomed to remain for a tour of the KCCC campus guided by Mr. Farnsworth.

"Congress will be returning to Washington on November 15. While most interest will be focused on expected changes following the election, there is significant unfinished business that must be completed before the 110th Congress concludes. Tax policy and appropriation bills head the issues that must be addressed next month, but there are several pending bills with a direct impact on NCISS members that could receive votes. These include data breach legislation (HR 2218/S3742) that mischaracterizes investigators as information brokers and "anti-spoofing" bills (HR 1258/S30). Also pending is the "Federal Protective Service Improvement and Accountability Act of 2010" (HR 6122) which is the first step toward replacing private security officers with federal employees. The House may also consider legislation to ban employer access to credit reports (HR 3149).

"The danger with "lame duck" sessions of Congress is that many members of congress will not be returning in January and can vote without any political risk. The Wall Street Journal reported yesterday that Senator Tom Harkin (D-IA) may bring the union backed "card check" bill to a vote in the Senate. That bill would end the right of employers to require a secret ballot election during union organizing campaigns.

"Virtually all the prognosticators are predicting substantial Republican gains in Congress on November 2. It is now conventional wisdom that the Republicans are likely to take over the House of Representatives and pick up just a few seats short of a majority in the Senate. If the Republicans fall just two seats short of a Senate takeover, it could get very interesting. Election analyst Charlie Cook said this week that there is speculation that conservative Democrat Ben Nelson of Nebraska and Senator Joe Lieberman (Ind-CT) could then be persuaded to jump to the Republican side."

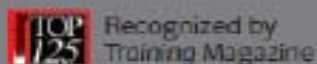
