Contract Security

The decision to outsource security can be difficult. The stakes are high, so it's no wonder hesitation is a common reaction when contemplating whether to outsource or not. The promised benefits of outsourced security are very attractive. Yet the potential to significantly increase security without hiring half a dozen people or spending a fortune is impossible to ignore. The issues with contract security are also very real. Far too often, being a security professional, we hear stories about contract security officers sleeping on the job or inadequate training of the officers. In this article I will attempt to point out some of the true benefits of contract security versus proprietary. The issues I will cover are cost, control, and liability.

At a time where procurement has stepped in to make security decisions due to reducing company costs and the government is cutting the defense budget over \$600 billion – cost is a crucial aspect when deciding to hire out security. Contract security decreases costs for companies in a few ways. The first is benefits. When you hire a contract security company you no longer have to worry about paying the high premiums associated with the security officers. Contract security companies manage the benefits for the officers they employ. Secondly, uniforms and tools associated with the job (i.e. flashlights, two-way radios and vehicles) are a responsibility of the security company. Lastly, sick leave, overtime costs or any human resource claim would be taken care of by the security company. The average cost to submit a claim for workers compensation is around \$4,700, according to Workers Compensation Institute. When the security company pays for these items, this doesn't mean they come at absolutely no cost to you. Contract security providers figure in these types of costs into your bill rate at the lowest possible price. For example, if there are three workers compensation claims in one month, you do not pay extra on your invoice because the security company would consume the cost.

When you employ a security officer within your individual company you in a sense take away some of your own control. Contract security officers are managed by the security company themselves. Amongst all of the monotonous tasks that come with managing employees such as; internal promotions, tenure, or employee evaluations you don't have to worry about them with contract security officers. In other words, if there is a problem with a contract security officer your account manager would be taking care of the problem long before the issue is even noticed by the client. Account managers are placed at the client sites in order to maintain a close eye on all security officers. When hiring out contract security, you are letting the company provide you with a service. Just like any other service you might have at your company, security providers want your business and in turn will comply with your requests.

If your company decides to go with proprietary security, it is responsible for taking the proper measures regarding background checks and ensuring an applicant has the proper training and skills to handle a job of this magnitude. When working with a contract security company, you wouldn't be liable for training, recruitment or background checks; it is handled by the security provider. Another way contract security reduces company liability is most security providers allow their customers to tailor the types of screenings conducted and any special training they want their officers to go through.

There are cases in which contract security wouldn't make sense for your location, such as a need for a more micromanaged security force. The benefits of contract security are apparent, if you combine that with a security company with unparalleled experience you will never want to look back at proprietary services. Another thing to keep in mind with contract security is security is their specialty. Day in and day out this is what they do and it is what they do best. With all of the responsibilities you already have in your current position, it might save you a lot of heartache to hand your security needs over to a security company to take care of. If you allow your company to focus on its core business and hire a company that focuses on protecting your company and its assets; you might find you save money, gain control, and diminish company liability.

CFATS Update

House Subcommittee Chairman Expected To Seek Long-Term Chemical Security Rules

Rep. Dan Lungren (R-Calif.), a member of the House Homeland Security Committee, is planning to introduce legislation providing a long-term reauthorization of federal chemical security rules, a committee aide said March 2.

Lungren will seek a seven-year reauthorization of the Department of Homeland Security's chemical facility antiterrorism standards (CFATS) program, which has been temporarily authorized under appropriations legislation, according to Matthew McCabe, the Republican counsel for the House Homeland Security Committee.

"We are not going to stray too far from the original authorizing language," McCabe said at a conference sponsored by the American Bar Association.

Lungren, who chairs the House Homeland Security Subcommittee on Cybersecurity, Infrastructure Protection, and Security Technologies, is expected to introduce his reauthorization bill March 3, a spokesman told BNA.

The CFATS program requires all high-risk chemical facilities to complete security vulnerability assessments, develop site security plans, and implement protective measures necessary to meet DHS-defined risk-based performance standards.

The program was enacted in October 2006 as part of a DHS appropriations bill. It was set to expire in October 2010, but Congress has temporarily extended it until March 18 under legislation providing stop-gap funding for federal agencies.

At a Feb. 11 subcommittee hearing, Lungren said that a long-term extension will "provide our chemical facility partners, who are spending millions of dollars implementing new security measures, with the assurance that the rules and requirements won't change from year to year as the CFATS program is implemented" ([42 ER 342, 2/18/11](#)).

Through lectures, discussions and classroom activities, students learn methods to identify and prioritize risks from all hazards, assess vulnerabilities, estimate consequences, and use equipment, training, and exercises to mitigate risk. The first day will be classroom instruction and the second day has a field activity.

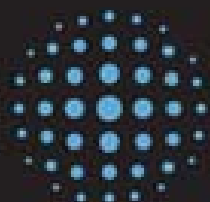
